## FIL2506/4630/31/32 - The Legacy of Frege and Russell

**Note:** by looking at the things we will be reading, you might well suspect that this is a standard seminar in the philosophy of language. This is not so. The principal focus is on issues that Frege and Russell set out to solve concerning the nature of thought and its relation to truth and the world. See the course description for further details.

I recommend that you read Tyler Burge's excellent paper 'Philosophy of Language and Mind: 1950-1990' (Phil. Review) early on in the semester. It is required reading for the course, but will serve as background reading.
