# Course 4445 EU and the Nation States: Policy Formulation and Implementation

Course leaders: Morten Egeberg and Åse Gornitzka

**Knowledge aim:** Increasingly, public policy results from decision processes that span several levels of governance. The course will highlight the relationship between the EU level and the national level regarding the formulation and implementation of policies. The role of institutions will be particularly emphasised in this respect, and analysed from various theoretical perspectives. Course participants are to learn how the European Commission, Union Council and European Parliament actually work and how politics within these key institutions reflects the way they are organised and recruited. Course participants are also to learn how EU-level executive bodies relate to national governments and how variation as regards the implementation of EU policies is to be explained.

**Skill aim:** After having finished the course, participants should be able to analyse decision processes within the multilevel EU system of governance, across policy fields. Such analytical skills help to predict and make sense of outcomes, and to possibly influence outcomes by identifying access points to a policy process and by knowing how to structure future processes.

**Teaching**: 10 lectures will be given.

**Knowledge requirements**: The course builds on a bachelor level in political science or European studies.
