SOME WORDS ON GOOD PRACTICE IN THE USE OF THE INTERNET FOR ACADEMIC ASSIGNMENTS AND RESEARCH

Students are increasingly turning to the internet as a resource for research and study. We encourage **selective**, **informed** and **accurate** use of the many resources that the internet has to offer.

- **Selective** internet use means using the internet as one resource among others (the library, books, journals, lectures, and tutorial discussions, and so on) rather than writing assignments based solely on web-based sources. Selective internet use also means *knowing which websites are reliable*. It is your responsibility as a student to assess the quality of the websites you use, and to ensure that they are reliable. In general, you are recommended to stick to official websites of institutions, organisations and respected media, rather than opinion or commentary sites. This is because, unlike journal articles or books, there are far fewer peer review processes to weed out false or dubious claims and arguments.
- Internet usage should be *informed* by these considerations (i.e., wikipedia is RARELY an acceptable source for an academic essay).
- References to internet sources should be *accurate*. Familiarize yourself with academic conventions for citing internet sources (you must include the author, the title of the article, the date, the EXACT web address -- URL -- of the page you accessed, and also give the DATE on which you accessed the information, because websites are frequently updated).

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
