

HUMR 5133 Business and Human Rights

Exam, fall 2014

General Instructions

1. The word limit for the exam is 4000 words.
2. Please indicate on the front page or in the introduction the sole or primary discipline you are employing for your essay. If your approach is interdisciplinary or multidisciplinary, please indicate which disciplines are being used. You will be graded within the confines of the chosen disciplines.
3. It is expected that you will use materials in and beyond the course pendum. This essay is partly designed to test your research skills.
4. Please use the author-date method for referencing secondary literature.
 - a. This requires a simple author-date citation in the main text (with any relevant page number) and the full citation in a bibliography.
 - b. The bibliography is not included in the word limit.
 - c. The full citation can follow an approved method in your discipline or you can use the method in the bibliography in Langford, *Business and Human Rights: Towards an Empirical Theory* (in Fronter).
5. Font: Times New Roman, font size 12 and a line spacing of 1.5.
6. Please follow either the standard Faculty Guidelines for referencing case law or the standard within the relevant jurisdiction from which the case emanates. Full references are not needed for treaties. Case law and treaties should be referenced in the footnotes.
7. Footnotes should otherwise be used sparingly. Use them for clarification purposes for example.
8. Please upload your Exam in Fronter with a document name formatted in the following style: **“Candidate Number - HUMR 5133 Final Exam”**.

Formal submission requirements

Please remember to indicate:

1. Your candidate number (4 numbers) on the front page of your document. We kindly ask you *not* to indicate your name. (How to find your candidate number: Go to Studentweb, log in, choose ‘status’ then ‘examination’. Then you will see your candidate number next to the course code. You will find your candidate number in Studentweb one week prior to the submission date.)
2. Course code (HUMR5702)
3. Title of the assignment
4. Number of words (e.g., use the word count in Word). NB! Remember to *include footnotes* when you do the word count!
5. Remember page numbering

Papers handed in after the deadline will not be considered.

1. Submit your term paper in Fronter on due date. Log into Fronter with your usual password and username, and find the room *HUMR5133- Assignment 2014-høst*. Go to the hand-in folder, then submit your home assignment in the following sub-folder: *Home assignment due 14 December* (room will be available by 1 December).

2. *If you are retaking the course from last year:* The system will not allow you to view the 'assignment'-folder in Fronter. You then need to contact the administration some days prior to the submission date by sending an e-mail to Morten Slind Olsen: m.s.olsen@jus.uio.no

After you have uploaded your mid-term paper/assignment in Fronter, the document will be strictly confidential (other students cannot view your document).

NB! Make sure that your assignment is *submitted in the correct folder* in the hand-in folder in Fronter – and *not outside* the folder; otherwise other students may view it!

3. **IMPORTANT:** When saving your file to be uploaded in the hand-in folder in Fronter, please use the name format indicated above under point 7 in the general instructions.

(NB! Make sure that your assignment is *submitted in the correct folder*).

4. Remember to fill in the self- declaration regarding cheating and submit it directly in Fronter (to be found in the folder 'Cheating declaration').

Rules about cheating and plagiarism.

When you take facts, thoughts, ideas, viewpoints and short or long quotations from others and use them in your own work, the sources you have used must be clearly stated. In other words you must not give the impression that others' thoughts, ideas, viewpoints and results are your own if they are not.

For example, using word-for-word or even paraphrasing the language of a UN Report without attributing the source of that language is plagiarism. Using another's idea without attributing the idea to the person who conceived it is also plagiarism.

Avoid quoting long excerpts and articles; short citations are preferred, and instead provide an evaluation of the literature that is necessary to defend your points of view.

Be sure that you are familiar with the use of sources and the rules for citing/quoting from others' work when writing assignments and theses.
