Lars Løvold is Director of Rainforest Foundation Norway. As the organization's Director since 1990, he has been instrumental in transforming Rainforest Foundation Norway from a fledgling initiative to a medium sized, broadly respected professional organization which plays a leading role within rainforest protection and support to indigenous peoples on the European continent. Løvold's academic background is a Social Anthropologist from the University of Oslo with long term field work (1980 and 1981) among the Gavião and Zoró indigenous peoples of the Western Brazilian Amazon.

Løvold has repeatedly represented Norwegian non-governmental organizations on the official Norwegian delegations to the Conference of the Parties of the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD) and the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC). Previous to his engagement for Rainforest Foundation Norway, Løvold was a research assistant at the Peace Research Institute of Oslo, managing editor of the Journal of Peace Research, a lecturer in environment and development at the Center for Environment and Development, University of Oslo, and an independent consultant.

Odd Isungset is an awarded Norwegian journalist and documentary film-maker. He studied journalism at Høgskulen i Volda, and he worked in NRK (Norwegian Broadcasting Company) for ten years and TV 2 (the largest commercial channel in Norway) for 17 years. In TV 2 he was working as a documentary director and for five years as head of the Documentary section. He is now an independent journalist mainly working with TV-documentaries and writes books based on investigative journalism.

In 2011 he received "Den store journalistprisen" (The Great Journalism Award) for his investigative book about the assassination attempt of the Norwegian publisher William Nygaard. Nygaard is known as the publisher of Salman Rushdie's books in Norway, and he was shot outside his



house in Oslo in 1993. Isungset is also awarded for his documentaries about the Muhammed-cartoons conflict and the documentary about the disaster of the submarine Kursk in the Barents Sea. Isungset was a member of the Press Complaints Commission in Norway for 10 years, six of them as its leader. He has been working with different issues regarding freedom of expression and self-regulation as an important guarantee for a free and independent press.
