Size: Maximum 2000 words (roughly 5 pages). Front page, contents page (optional) and bibliography are not included. If footnotes are used in the text (at the bottom of each page), they are included in the 2000 word limit. **Papers that exceed the 2000 word limit will be disallowed.**

Cheating: Any exam at the University of Oslo is being checked for both correct word count and incidents of cheating. Text recognition software will be used to find cases of plagiarism. Failure to cite sources or highlight quotes in any assignments that are handed in is considered cheating. You must cite the source if you obtain data, reasoning and arguments from the literature, syllabus and
