

When designers want to understand use

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If designers want to do ethnography Hannah Arendt's framework for what it is to be human should be considered – where should *Your design (your work)* fit in, and for what do you want to be acknowledge as a designer

The human condition: humans are suspended in three strings that keeps us moving in the world:

Labor: the process by which we produce and reproduce in living exchange with the environment.

Work: the traces we leave behind when we leave/die, and which is also the meaning we attribute to our being in the world, the project we imagine to be engaged in.

Doing: the act of interacting with the environment through which we make ourselves recognized as individuals. It is by our doings we stand up and stand out

... if you as designer still want to do ethnography, then consider ...

Don't

- Assume you already know
- Go to the field with 'an open mind'
- Rely on those who are willing to talk

Do

- Prepare and get to know as much as you can in advance
- Make your own assumptions explicit
- Make sure you cover the field in question

Instead of thinking 'use' – think: action, and look for appropriation

Action as in activity theory

- intentional
- shaped by opportunities, capabilities, and environmental constraints
- part a living, self-regulating system
- interplay between doing and talking
- sensemaking

Appropriation (Bakhtin)

- (1) Anticipation
- (2) initial familiarity
- (3) development of repertoires of routines
- (4) development of new forms of use

UserTEC wp 2: What we know, our prejudices, and pattern-coverage

- We can assume that 50% will be forced users, and since 'all' is important in case of consumption reduction, we must cover patterns of both forced users and first movers
- We seek patterns of interplay between doing and talking regarding 'Anticipation', 'initial familiarity', 'development of repertoires of routines', 'development of new forms of use'
- The patterns we find, we communicate to our group through a toolbox of materials: video-scenarios, games, prototype-mock ups
- The burning issues we take up and research ourselves, too

HEMS dilemmas - how to make ethnography inform them?

Automatic regulation versus situated self-determined regulation

One in all or all in one

Self-explanatory operation versus operational training

- We over and over hear households talk about the logic of the controls of their house
- The lead users also say that they want to 'know' their house
- One of the forced users talk about what a nice proces it is to 'set the lightning' herself
- And where does that take us?

Two burning issues in the 'ethno-UserTEC material'

- Customers are not happy with the work of the installer
- communication from customer to installer and from producer to builder and from builder to installer reveal a very silo'ed communication-situation in the building sector regarding customers/users
