

ANTH4030 – Advanced Anthropological Methods

Exam regulations for the reflection papers, Autumn 2020

Specific requirements:

Combine 3 reflection papers into one document (900-1500 words). Use the title "Final reflection paper in Anthropological Methods."

Each reflection paper should have the following structure: an introduction, an analysis that *engages with the course readings in relation to anthropological methods*, conclusion and a list of references. Write in Times New Roman, font size 12, with line spacing 2.0. You may submit your response in English only.

Optional: Draw on three reflection papers to discuss the implications for your own longer MA fieldwork in one single essay. How does your experience of the mini fieldwork, or current things you are thinking about for your MA fieldwork help illustrate issues and challenges discussed in the course readings? If you choose to write this form of essay, one introduction, analysis and conclusion is for the entire text.

The exam paper must:

- Have numbered pages
- Have a header that specifies
 - The course code and title
 - Semester and year (e.g. Autumn 2020)
 - Your candidate number. Do **NOT** write your name in your exam paper. You find your candidate number in the StudentWeb.
- Have a cover page that specifies the same content as the header, as well as the **total number of words**.
- Meet the correct word count stated above, otherwise it may be rejected administratively.
- Be uploaded as one **PDF** file in Inspira before the announced deadline.
